OUR STRATEGIC EXPANSION INTO ZAMBIA





OUR STRATEGIC EXPANSION INTO ZAMBIA

Since establishing our S.H.E. Programme in Zimbabwe's Tsholotsho and Beatrice districts, we have witnessed significant positive changes in the lives of our beneficiaries, their families, and the broader communities. Recognising that the challenges faced by young girls extend beyond rural areas in Zimbabwe and are prevalent throughout Africa, we made the strategic decision to expand our S.H.E. Programme globally at the end of 2022. This global expansion began with our establishment in Zambia.

We selected Zambia as our next location based on research indicating that 58% of the population lives below the international monetary poverty line of US\$1.90/£1.56 per day. Moreover, only 27% of girls in Zambia complete their upper secondary school, a number that drops to a mere 3% among the poorest children. Disturbingly, 29% of Zambian girls are married before the age of 18, with 5% married before the age of 15. These statistics underscored the urgent need for our S.H.E. Programme's initiatives to help address these issues.

After conducting thorough research to determine the most suitable district in Zambia to implement our S.H.E. Programme, we chose the Chibombo district, located 100km from Lusaka, the capital city. This district experiences extreme poverty, with a limited presence of non-profit organisations. Consequently, many girls in Chibombo are deprived of access to education, which contributes to the high rates of abuse and mistreatment of young girls in the district.

After obtaining registration to operate in the Chibombo district, we collaborated with local authorities who presented five schools for our consideration. We conducted visits to each school, carefully assessing their needs and identifying girl-child-related issues prevalent within their respective environments. Armed with this information, we made an informed decision to provide support to two schools.

The schools' administration recommended prospective beneficiaries, young vulnerable girls in primary school, for our consideration. To ensure a comprehensive understanding of their backgrounds, family dynamics, and the broader challenges they faced, each prospective beneficiary and her family underwent a thorough needs assessment conducted by our Catalyst team.



Based on these assessments, we chose twenty-two beneficiaries, with eleven selected from each school, and formally welcomed them into the S.H.E. Programme. Each beneficiary received an individualised support plan tailored to address her specific personal circumstances and needs. Moving forward, should any new needs arise, we will thoroughly analyse them and incorporate appropriate solutions into the support plans to the best of our abilities.




















As a result of the successful implementation of our S.H.E. Programme in Zambia in 2023, we have made the decision to further expand in the Chibombo district. In January 2024, we collaborated with the local authorities who presented us with another five schools for our consideration. After conducting our assessments, we selected another two schools to support and selected an additional eighteen beneficiaries, nine beneficiaries from each school. This now brings our total number of beneficiaries in Zambia to forty across four schools in the district.





S.H.E PROGRAMME: OPERATIONS MANAGER REPORT

Through strategic resource allocation and prioritisation of interventions that directly address the needs of our beneficiaries, we have achieved optimal effectiveness in our S.H.E. Programme's initiatives and brought about substantial, meaningful change in their lives."

S.H.E PROGRAMME: IMPACT HIGHLIGHTS

Direct Beneficiary Support Psychosocial (PSS) Counselling

Implementation of our Psychosocial support

Throughout the year, we conducted multiple psychosocial support sessions to address the emotional and psychological needs of our beneficiaries. Our partnership with Shanduko Yeupenyu Child Care in the Beatrice district of Zimbabwe introduced two powerful PSS tools called the Journey of Life and the Tree Diagram. These tools are designed to assess social structures related to children and identify social issues that can impact their development, with a specific focus on family structure, such as divorce, single-parent households, abusive environments, lack of parental support and guidance, and other challenges that may affect their academic journey.

During the assessments, twelve beneficiaries were present, and 71% of them highlighted a lack of positive parenting at home. Among these beneficiaries, three girls were identified as needing immediate attention. In response, we engaged in conversations with both the parents/caregivers and the beneficiaries in collaboration with Shanduko Yeupenyu Child Care. These discussions led to the development of tailored empowerment plans to address their specific needs.



In the Tsholotsho district of Zimbabwe, we collaborated with DREAMS Out of a total of twenty-five beneficiaries, twenty-three of them (92%) now demonstrate the confidence to express themselves to the counsellors, compared to a previous count of only nineteen. This increase can be attributed to our continuous encouragement for beneficiaries to openly share any challenges they are facing, allowing us to provide appropriate support.

Among our beneficiaries, three reported challenges within their households. The first beneficiary expressed a severe identity crisis and a desire to no longer live with her uncle. To address this issue, we sought assistance from the local Social Services. The second beneficiary was identified as needing more affection from her caregivers, while the third beneficiary mentioned attending school on an empty stomach due to acute food problems at home. After identifying these issues, we developed support plans to address their specific needs.





Furthermore, in the Chibombo district of Zambia, we partnered with One Stop Centre, conducting numerous group sessions and providing individual counselling to our beneficiaries. These sessions created a safe space for them to express their thoughts and concerns.

During these sessions, five beneficiaries were identified as needing psychosocial support. Two of them, who are sisters and live with their uncle, disclosed that they were not receiving adequate care and were being mistreated. They expressed a desire to be relocated to their parents in different provinces. Through intensive counselling with professional counsellors from One Stop Centre, their situation was successfully stabilised, and they are now doing well. The third beneficiary experienced physical and verbal abuse from her uncle, who denied their familial ties. The fourth beneficiary faced similar abuse and restrictions on contacting her father or other relatives. The fifth beneficiary comes from a family struggling with poverty. With her mother's disability, and her father's abandonment, life at ome has been really tough for the beneficiary. Despite these cases being ongoing, we are confident that we will be able to fully address these beneficiaries issues in the near future.

In conclusion, the impact of these sessions on the mental well-being of our beneficiaries has been substantial. They have gained emotional support, learned coping strategies, and developed a sense of belonging within the school community. As a result, we have established referral systems in each district to connect our beneficiaries and their families with external mental health professionals or specialised services when needed.









Direct Beneficiary Support Healthcare / Menstrual Hygiene

Enhanced well-being and positive outcomes

During the screening process, several health issues were identified among the beneficiaries. However, it is crucial to emphasize that significant improvements have been observed in their overall well-being as a result of the interventions provided through our S.H.E. Programme in Zambia. These positive changes reflect the effectiveness of our efforts in promoting their health and well-being.

Normal hearing and vision screenings

Out of the forty beneficiaries, thirty-seven had normal hearing and vision, which is an encouraging result. This indicates that the majority of the beneficiaries have intact sensory capabilities, allowing them to engage fully in their daily activities and educational pursuits.

Mental health support and additional interventions


To address mental health concerns, our S.H.E. Programme incorporates S.H.E. Clubs, which have proven to be beneficial for the well-being of the beneficiaries. Additionally, we provide assistance with food hampers and regular clinic visits to ensure their ongoing well-being. These interventions have contributed to the overall improvement in the well-being of our beneficiaries. Furthermore, all beneficiaries are receiving continuous mental health assessments, counseling, and engaging activities to stimulate better thought processes. These efforts have resulted in stable results in various other tests.

Individual updates

Joy was found to have a high hemoglobin (HB) level, possibly due to the multivitamins she was taking. The nurse will monitor her progress for any changes and has referred her to the clinic for further assessment.







Blessing reported an itching and painful ear, but fortunately, it does not seem to be affecting her hearing.

Both Odetta and Aproxillia are receiving special attention in counseling due to their uncomfortable home situations. It is important to note that no immediate threat has been observed, but providing them with additional support and guidance can help them navigate their circumstances better.

Addressing identified health issues

The identified health issues are being addressed through appropriate interventions and monitoring to ensure the well-being of these beneficiaries. Our dedicated team will continue to provide the necessary support and guidance to address their specific needs and ensure their overall health and welfare.

The S.H.E. Programme remains committed to the well-being and development of these beneficiaries, empowering them to overcome challenges and thrive in their lives.

Beatrice, Zimbabwe 婱

Anerudo's progress and resilience

We are thrilled to share that Anerudo has made remarkable progress since her previous health assessments, during which she required assistance for various health concerns. Her dedication and perseverance have resulted in significant improvements in her overall well-being. It is truly heartwarming to witness her growth and development as she continues on her journey towards optimal health.

Normal hearing and vision screenings

The majority of our beneficiaries underwent screenings, which confirmed that their hearing and vision are within normal ranges. This positive outcome indicates that their sensory capabilities are intact, allowing them to engage fully in their daily activities and educational pursuits.

Support for Ropafadzo

Ropafadzo has unfortunately been involved in an ongoing sexual abuse case. Upon learning about this distressing situation, she underwent a comprehensive medical examination and a mental health assessment to address the trauma she experienced. Currently, she is receiving ongoing counseling and psychotherapy to support her healing process. As a result of these interventions, her school attendance has improved, and her home environment is being carefully assessed to ensure her ongoing safety and well-being.

In addition to these physical improvements, the beneficiaries exhibited improved skin texture and a generally brighter outlook, reflecting their enhanced well-being.

Academic challenges and social growth

While some beneficiaries are still facing challenges with low grades in school, there has been observed improvement in their social skills. This positive development is an encouraging sign that they are making progress in their interactions and relationships with others. It highlights the positive impact of our program in fostering social growth and inclusivity.

Individual updates

Sibaliso continues to use her hearing aids, and the nurse responsible for her care has planned reviews beginning in the next school term. However, it is important to note that her hearing situation has significantly improved, which is a positive development in her overall well-being.

Lungile, who previously exhibited continuous verbal aggression at home, has reported an improvement in the situation. Not only has the aggressive behavior decreased, but her attitude toward handling issues has also improved. No further threats have been observed, indicating progress in her emotional well-being.

Continuous mental health support

All beneficiaries are receiving continuous mental health assessments, counseling, and engaging in mentally stimulating activities. These interventions are designed to promote better thought processes and overall mental well-being. By providing comprehensive mental health support, we aim to equip the beneficiaries with the necessary tools to navigate challenges and foster resilience.

The combined efforts of the S.H.E. Programme and the dedication of the beneficiaries have led to positive outcomes in their well-being. We remain committed to their ongoing growth and success, supporting them as they continue their journey towards a brighter future.

In addition to the health check examinations, we conducted nutrition assessments using the Dietary Diversity Assessment tool to evaluate and determine the nutritional requirements of our beneficiaries. This allowed us to ensure that they were consuming appropriate and balanced meals at home.

To raise awareness about the health and well-being of our beneficiaries, we collaborated with local healthcare professionals and organisations to conduct specialised health workshops. These workshops covered topics such as sexual and reproductive health education, menstrual hygiene management, and prevention of common illnesses. The aim was to equip our beneficiaries with knowledge and skills to maintain their health and make informed decisions regarding their well-being.

Through these initiatives, we strive to prioritise the overall health and well-being of our beneficiaries, providing them with the necessary resources and information to lead healthy lives.



Direct Beneficiary Support Education

Back-to-School Campaigns

Our back-to-school campaigns play a crucial role in supporting the education of both day scholars and boarding beneficiaries. We aim to remove significant barriers to education by providing essential resources. Our efforts include distributing food hampers, complete school uniforms, shoes, textbooks, trunks for boarding students, blankets, sheets, stationery, and satchels. Additionally, we cover full school fee payments for all beneficiaries.

By addressing these critical needs, we aim to empower our beneficiaries to pursue their academic goals barrier-free.

Within the Programme's department, we have established Individual Education Plans (I.E.Ps.) and Individual Care Plans (I.C.Ps.) as integral components of our commitment to providing bespoke support to our beneficiaries. Implementation of our Academic Improvement Models

Teacher - Beneficiary Meetings

Throughout the year, we coordinated a total of 480 teacher-beneficiary meetings with the aim of promoting open communication, addressing concerns regarding our beneficiaries' performance in class, and providing feedback on their academic progress. These meetings had a significant impact as they fostered a supportive environment where our beneficiaries felt valued and listened to. Additionally, they played a crucial role in strengthening the relationships between teachers and beneficiaries, improving their academic support, and enhancing overall engagement in the classroom.

Academic Improvement Activities

We acknowledge that the mainstream school curriculum have limitations in addressing the diverse needs of our beneficiaries. To supplement and enhance the curriculum, we have implemented an extra lesson programme that provides additional learning opportunities for beneficiaries in need of this support beyond the scope of the traditional schooling curriculum. In many schools, the learner-to-learner ratio remains really high. These extra lessons are conducted on a monthly basis, in collaboration with the school teachers, following progress assessments for each beneficiary.

Tsholotsho, Zimbabwe 🝃

After analysing the academic progression of all twenty-five beneficiaries, it was identified that seven of them were in need of extra lesson support. Subsequently, all seven beneficiaries commenced their extra lessons and have since demonstrated significant improvement in their respective subjects. We are pleased to report that all beneficiaries successfully passed their most recent examinations.

In addition to these extra lessons, we also organised a plethora of other English enhancement activities that have proven to be incredibly effective. These activities are outlined below:

Beatrice, Zimbabwe 🝃

We held engaging spelling bee competitions and fun reading exercises as part of our academic improvement initiatives. The dedicated efforts of our teachers and the active participation of our primary beneficiaries resulted in a remarkable increase in the pass rate for the English subject. In fact, their English proficiency improved by an impressive 10%.

The implementation of these activities, including spelling bee competitions, reading exercises, and extra lessons, had a tangible impact on the sentence-building skills of our beneficiaries. They demonstrated the ability to construct grammatically correct and coherent sentences, showcasing significant improvement. Moreover, the spelling bee competitions played a crucial role in boosting the confidence of our beneficiaries in tackling unfamiliar words. This newfound confidence positively influenced their reading comprehension and facilitated the expansion of their vocabulary. Consequently, they developed a better understanding of word meanings.



The exposure to a wide range of vocabulary through spelling bee competitions and reading exercises enriched their selection of words, empowering them to comprehend and utilise words effectively within context. We are thrilled to witness the transformative effects of these initiatives on our beneficiaries' language skills and overall academic growth.

Chibombo (Zambia) 🗊

We coordinated a reading marathon and a spelling bee competition to gather statistics on the proficiency of our beneficiaries in reading, writing, and spelling. The purpose of this initiative was to understand how we can expand and improve their English comprehension and spelling skills.

From these initiatives, we discovered that there is need for assistance among the beneficiaries in the four schools we support. Out of a total of thirty-eight beneficiaries, twenty-two girls (58%) demonstrated the ability to read and spell words at their expected level. However, 16 of them (42%) faced challenges in reading and spelling.

With this valuable data in hand, we have begun implementing support plans for continuous reading programmes. To date, we have already started seeing great improvements, and we are confident that these programmes over time will greatly assist our beneficiaries in achieving greater proficiency in English.




Academic Exposure Trips

Our secondary school beneficiaries in the Beatrice district of Zimbabwe had the opportunity to participate in two educational trips to Domboshava and Great Zimbabwe. These trips were designed to expand our beneficiaries' educational horizons, facilitate experiential learning, and promote academic development.



The impact of these trips was profound, as our beneficiaries experienced significant academic enrichment and personal growth. The trips also fostered motivation, increased engagement, and provided a broader worldview. We are excited about scheduling more of these trips in the future to continue nurturing the educational journey of our beneficiaries.





Parent/Caregiver and Community Engagement

Over the course of the past year, a series of meetings were held with the aim of actively involving parents/ caregivers in their daughters' education. These gatherings provided a platform to address concerns, share updates on school activities, and foster a stronger sense of collaboration between parents/caregivers and the school staff. The positive outcomes of these meetings were evident in the heightened levels of engagement, the establishment of improved lines of communication between parents/caregivers and school personnel, and the cultivation of a robust support system for our beneficiaries.

Direct Beneficiary Support Skills Training Workshops

Since April 2023, we have been actively conducting a diverse range of skills training workshops for all of our beneficiaries. These workshops serve as a valuable complement to their formal education, providing them with practical skills that not only enhance their academic performance but also foster a deeper sense of engagement.

At Catalyst Foundation, we firmly believe that skills training plays a pivotal role in enhancing girls' employability and empowering them economically. By equipping our beneficiaries with market-relevant skills, vocational training, entrepreneurship, and financial literacy, we ensure that they are well-prepared to enter the workforce with confidence or even embark on their own entrepreneurial journeys. Through these comprehensive workshops we are not only nurturing capable individuals but also empowering them to contribute meaningfully to their communities and society as a whole.

The workshops held across all districts included:

Beatrice, Zimbabwe ⋟

• Basic Computer Skills Training

Recognising the importance of digital literacy in today's world, we organised a basic computer skills training workshop for our beneficiaries. The training aimed to equip the beneficiaries with essential computer skills such as operating a computer, using productivity tools, and accessing the internet. The significance of this training law in empowering our beneficiaries with the knowledge and skills

this training lay in empowering our beneficiaries with the knowledge and skills required to participate in the digital age, access information, explore opportunities online, and facilitate personal growth.

Mango Chutney Making as a Food Preservation

Due to the El Niño drought and its impact on agricultural production, it was crucial to provide our beneficiaries with alternative food preservation techniques. We conducted a training session on making mango chutney, which was facilitated by Sarrie (volunteer), emphasising its role in food preservation. This training aimed to teach our beneficiaries how to preserve food using locally available ingredients and preserving it for long-term consumption.

• Baking, Sewing, Knitting

Our beneficiaries learn't how to bake muffins and brownies. Sarrie (volunteer) also taught our beneficiaries and the S.H.E. team how to sew, knit and crotchet where everyone involved made beautiful cushions and pillow cases.

Bead Making

We partnered with Road Map Trust Zimbabwe to provide a bead-making training session to promote creativity and entrepreneurship. The training enhanced the artistic and craft-making skills of our beneficiaries, teaching them to create unique beadwork for personal use or sale as handicrafts. This skill development opens doors for our beneficiaries to participate in the local arts and crafts market and potentially start their own small businesses.











• Chigubhu Solar Lantern Making

We partnered with Zambezi Ark Technologies, where our beneficiaries learnt how to make solar lanterns out of plastic bottles. Not only did this training equip our beneficiaries with valuable technical life skills, but it also enabled them to learn more about renewable energy and sustainable practices to reduce plastic pollution and positively contribute to climate mitigation.

Tsholotsho, Zimbabwe 🍃

A total reach of 250 learners benefited from our skills training workshops in all four schools. In agriculture, all our beneficiaries did well in land preparation. 80% of the learners comprehended hairdressing, and forty-five out of fifty-five learners gave clear responses on the financial literacy session.



• Weaving grass baskets

This activity was led by a local elderly woman from the Tsholotsho community, who volunteered to teach our beneficiaries how to weave grass baskets from scratch.

• Baking 'magwinya and patties'

Our beneficiaries had a blast learning the skills needed to bake a local dish called 'magwinya and patties', which involved making dough out of onions, soya beans and potatoes, and then baking it until cooked. In the future, we plan for our beneficiaries to bake this dish in bulk, and then sell it to other learners and teachers at their schools, which not only will equip them with baking skills but entrepreneurial skills as well.

• Doormat Making

A trainer recommended by Social Welfare conducted a three-day training session on doormat making as a survival skill for our beneficiaries. Out of thirty-eight girls on the S.H.E. Programme, thirty participated in the training. Post-training evaluations showed that twelve of the trained beneficiaries demonstrated high competence, capable of making and completing a doormat independently. The remaining eighteen beneficiaries acquired the skill but faced challenges in the process. This indicates that while a significant portion of our beneficiaries benefited from the training, further practice or additional support will be needed for those who experienced difficulties to ensure all beneficiaries can utilise this skill effectively



We are now currently in the process of drafting our S.H.E. Programme Skills Training Module and Handbook as part of standardising our activities across all districts.

Beneficiary Family Support Living Conditions Improvement Home Visits

These visits are an integral part of our approach to empowering and enabling our beneficiaries. They facilitate trust-building between Catalyst Foundation and our beneficiaries' families, allowing us to develop a deeper understanding of their circumstances and engage with parents and guardians effectively. By assessing the home environment, providing guidance and support, and monitoring progress, we create a comprehensive support system that maximises our beneficiaries' educational opportunities and overall development. These home visits took place on a monthly basis, covering all the beneficiaries' homes at least once each month, and ideally more times when issues are identified.



Housing Support for our Beneficiaries' Families

We facilitated the construction and subsequent provision of a toilet facility and a two-bedroom house for two beneficiary households demonstrating our commitment to girl-child enablement through education. By addressing the families' basic needs and improving their living conditions, we actively contribute to the overall well-being of the beneficiaries and create an environment that supports their educational pursuits.

Building Ropafadzo and Princess' New Family Home (Beatrice, Zimbabwe 🝃)

Ropafadzo and Princess, two S.H.E. Programme beneficiaries in the Beatrice district of Zimbabwe, were living in a cramped and deteriorating mud hut measuring only 3m x 3m. The hut was shared among seven family members of different ages, and its inadequacy had far-reaching consequences for their education, security, health, and overall well-being.



Recognising the urgent need to address their housing situation, Catalyst Foundation made it a priority to improve their living conditions. Our objective was to enhance their education, ensure their health and well-being, and uplift their overall quality of life. Working closely with the family, we developed a comprehensive plan to construct their dream house. With the guidance of an architect, we meticulously designed a new home that catered to their specific needs and aspirations.

Once we had a clear vision of what Ropafadzo and Princess's new home would look like, we sought financial support from our dedicated supporters in the United Kingdom. Fortunately, the project received full funding through the generosity of seven individuals, enabling us to commence construction without delay. The entire Catalyst team came together as a united family, collaborating with local contracted builders throughout every phase of the project.

After four months of construction, Ropafadzo and Princess's new family home was completed, bringing them immeasurable joy and happiness. This achievement symbolised their resilience and marked the beginning of a future filled with boundless possibilities. The pivotal moment arrived when our C.E.O. handed over the keys to their parents, ushering in a new chapter marked by hope, stability, and abundant opportunities. The family now proudly resides in a comfortable and secure environment they can truly call home, experiencing firsthand the positive impact of their improved living conditions.

Building Kongisile and her Family's New Toilet (Chibombo, Zambia 🍞)

Meeting Khongisile and her grandmother was an absolute privilege, and their story deeply moved us. The unwavering love that Khongisile's grandmother has for her grandchildren, coupled with her determination to ensure they receive an education, left us feeling inspired and humbled.





As we stepped into Khongisile's home, we could not help but notice the vulnerability that surrounded them. It became painfully clear that their bathroom was not only inadequate, but also presented numerous challenges for the entire family. We knew that after hearing that Khongisile's grandmother struggles to stand while bathing, immediate action was necessary. Determined to make a difference, we wholeheartedly committed to rebuilding their bathroom. Witnessing the gratitude and disbelief in Khongisile's grandmother's eyes as tears welled up repeatedly, was an overwhelming experience. It was a moment of both joy and astonishment for her to realise that her family would now have a purpose-built bathroom that catered to their needs.

In the end, it was the power of compassion and our shared belief in the importance of supporting one another that brought about this incredible transformation. We are honored to have been a part of Khongisile and her grandmother's journey, and we hope that their story will continue to inspire others to make a difference in the lives of those who need it most.





Beneficiary Family Support Sustainable Livelihood Development

As an organisation dedicated to fostering resilience and sustainable practices, we embarked on a project with the objective of empowering three beneficiary families. Two of these families received a solar water pump and seeds to support their farming endeavors, while the third family received funds to purchase baby chicks for a poultry project. Through our support, these families were able to successfully establish and sustain their projects, resulting in the cultivation of various crops and vegetables, as well as the healthy growth of the chickens.

The positive outcomes of these initiatives extended beyond improving the overall nutrition of the families. The projects also reduced their reliance on external sources for food. Moreover, the surplus produce from these endeavors empowered the families to generate income by selling the excess in local markets. This economic empowerment significantly enhanced their financial stability and contributed to their self-reliance.

Our Beneficiary, School and Community Support S.H.E. Clubs

Our S.H.E. Clubs have been dedicated to empowering learners (both boys and girls) at the schools we collaborate with. We achieved this by organising interactive sessions and discussions on a wide range of subjects. The primary objective was to foster leadership skills, boost self-esteem, and raise awareness about

gender equality among the learners. Furthermore, we aimed to provide the learners with comprehensive information on topics of their interest, enabling them to make well-informed decisions. By providing a platform for active participation, expression of thoughts, and deeper understanding of critical issues, we empowered learners to effectively navigate life's challenges. The profound impact of the S.H.E. Clubs was evident in the noticeable improvements in the learners' confidence, assertiveness, and sense of belonging.



Analysis of our S.H.E. Clubs' activities Beatrice, Zimbabwe **>**

We explored a range of important topics in our S.H.E. Club, including bullying, hygiene, and confidence building. These topics were suggested by the learners themselves during a survey where we asked them about their day-to-day experiences and what they wanted to learn. It wass incredible to see the impact of our initiatives, as our S.H.E. Clubs reached a total of 900 learners across six primary schools throughout the year. This widespread reach clearly demonstrates the significant influence we have in raising awareness and fostering positive change among the learners.

Impact:

- Bullying: Approximately ten to fifteen learners in primary schools have reported being bullied by their peers. In response to this issue, our objective was to establish a secure and inclusive learning environment that fostered positive social interactions and minimised the detrimental effects of bullying. Additionally, we encouraged these learners to promptly report any instances of abuse from their peers or members of the community to trusted adults or teachers within the school.
- Hygiene: Considering the social and geographical backgrounds of our predominantly remote and rural-based learners, we took the initiative to address the issue of hygiene. Through careful observation, we noticed that a significant number of learners arrive at school in an unclean state. Thus, in the S.H.E. Club, we placed great importance on fostering personal hygiene habits. This included emphasising the need for regularly brushing teeth, daily bathing, washing uniforms, maintaining cleanliness, and promoting healthy eating habits.
- Confidence Building: Nurturing self-confidence among learners is crucial for their personal growth, academic achievements, and future prospects. Through our dedicated S.H.E. Clubs, we successfully tackled confidence-related concerns, empowering learners to cultivate resilience, assertiveness, and a positive self image. These invaluable qualities enable them to conquer obstacles, actively participate in their education, and improve their overall well-being.

We have managed to reach 750 learners at our two primary schools and total of 900 at two secondary schools.

Chibombo, Zambia 🍞

Our S.H.E. Clubs were implemented across all four schools, utilising role plays and question-and-answer sessions as the primary methodologies. The sessions reached a total of 517 learners, promoting open communication and providing a platform for learners to share their ideas and experiences. Feedback from both learners and teachers indicated an increase in confidence levels among the learners from the sessions.

One notable case involved a girl from one of the schools who reported a concerning situation regarding her friend, a 14-year-old girl who had not attended school since January due to her family's intention to marry her off. This case was promptly addressed in collaboration with partners such as the Police Victim Support Unit (VSU), the Headteacher of the school, and the One Stop Centre. The girl was located and expressed her willingness to return to school, with the condition of receiving school uniforms and books. This incident highlighted the importance and impact of the S.H.E. Clubs in providing a supportive environment where critical issues affecting learners can be identified and effectively addressed.



Our Beneficiary, School and Community Support Sporting Programme Assistance

Introduction of our school Sporting Programme Assistance

In July 2023, we launched our groundbreaking sports programme assistance in Beatrice, Zimbabwe. This innovative initiative was designed to provide comprehensive support to the schools we have partnered with, with the primary goal of fostering a love for sports and physical activities among the learners. As part of our commitment to inclusivity, we have placed a special emphasis on empowering the girl-child through this programme. By providing girls with equal opportunities and resources, we aim to break down barriers and create a more equitable playing field.

Reasons for Introducing our Sporting Programme Assistance:

We firmly believe that sports play a vital role in the well-rounded development of learners by promoting physical fitness, teamwork, leadership, and self-confidence. Recognising the immense potential of sports as a tool for empowerment, the programme was introduced to ensure that girls have equal opportunities to participate in sports alongside their male counterparts.



Implementation in Schools with National School Sporting Activities:

Numerous schools currently offer national school sports programmes that predominantly focus on male learners. Although these programmes are praiseworthy, we have observed a noticeable gender imbalance, where girls have limited chances to participate and demonstrate their sporting talents. Hence, we have taken it upon ourselves to introduce our sports programme assistance in these schools, guaranteeing that female learners have the opportunity to actively participate in sports and reap the benefits of the associated personal growth and development.



Our Role in Implementing the Programme:

We worked closely with the school authorities, teachers, and sports coordinators to create a comprehensive Standard Operating Procedure Manual (S.O.P.). This manual serves as a valuable resource for the school's sports coordinators, offering detailed instructions on how to organise sporting tournaments, manage teams, schedule practices, and promote gender inclusivity in sports. Additionally, we have played a crucial role in donating sports equipment to schools in Beatrice and Tsholotsho (Zimbabwe), to enhance their sporting programmes and provi learners with the tools they need to succeed.



Securing Partnership Agreements:

To ensure the sustainability and long-term impact of the programme, we are actively working towards securing partnership agreements with the heads of the participating schools. These agreements will formalize the collaboration between our organization and the schools, outlining the mutual responsibilities, resource allocation, and support mechanisms necessary for the successful continuation of the sporting programs. Our primary objective in establishing these partnerships is to guarantee the longevity of the programme and expand its reach to additional schools in the future.











Our Beneficiary, School and Community Support Environmental Protection and Climate Change Education

Introduction of our school sporting programme assistance

We firmly believe that offering environmental protection and climate change education to the schools and communities we assist is crucial in increasing awareness about the pressing environmental issues we face today. By doing so, we aim to empower learners, schools, and the communities to take on the role of environmental stewards. Through this education, we equip them with the necessary knowledge and skills to effectively adapt to and mitigate the impacts of climate change.

Beatrice, Zimbabwe ⋟

We had the honour of collaborating with the Forestry Commission Zimbabwe and Ellyanne Chlystun-Githae Wanjiku, Africa's Youngest Climate Champion at just 13 years old, hailing from Kenya. Together, we embarked on a tree planting initiative at Ringa Primary School in the Beatrice district of Zimbabwe where over 50 trees were planted, symbolising our commitment to environmental conservation.

Ellyanne has been instrumental in addressing the adverse effects of climate change on vulnerable communities, having already planted over 1.3 million trees.

We extend our sincere gratitude to the Forestry Commission Zimbabwe for their generous donation of trees, and to Ellyanne Chlystun-Githae Wanjiku for educating the Ringa school community on the importance of their involvement in combating climate change. It was truly a remarkable day filled with meaningful impact.

Over the past six months, we successfully organised informative adolescence talks and engaging career day workshops at the schools that we proudly support in Zimbabwe and Zambia.

Cholera Health Awareness Campaign

Over the past six months, we conducted comprehensive health campaigns in response to the cholera outbreaks in Zambia and Zimbabwe. The main focus of the campaign was to prevent cholera and promote proper hygiene practices. As part of the campaign, hygiene kits, including water buckets with taps, were distributed to the communities. This initiative played a crucial role in promoting health and preventing the spread of cholera. The impact of the campaigns was evident in the improved knowledge of hygiene best practices among the community members, a reduction in health risks, and the creation of a healthier environment for the community as a whole.



Donation of Maternity Pads

Beatrice, Zimbabwe ≽

As part of our community outreach efforts, we donated forty-eight maternity pads to Muda Clinic. The clinic, located more than 50 km away from the Beatrice main road, was facing transportation challenges and had not received maternity pads for the past four years. The nurse in charge expressed profound gratitude for our donation, highlighting the direct impact it would have on the care provided to expectant mothers in need, significantly enhancing their well-being.

We extend heartfelt thanks to the Beatrice Sports Club committee for their generous donation of the pads, which were collected during their annual Beatrice Bushpig Big Bash event. This collaboration allowed us to make a positive impact and improve the lives of deserving women in the community.

Child Protection, Awareness and Prevention Campaigns Safeguarding Trainings

Safeguarding trainings were conducted in close collaboration with local authorities and organisations to ensure a prompt response to child protection concerns. We partnered with organisations such as VFU (Victim-Friendly Unit) police and the social welfare department to raise awareness about child protection, gender-based violence, and safety measures in twelve out of the fourteen schools we work with in Zimbabwe and Zambia.

To empower the girls and equip them with the necessary knowledge and skills, we organised workshops focused on self-protection and seeking support when needed. These workshops had a positive impact, as they increased awareness of their rights, improved safety measures, and fostered a supportive environment for reporting and addressing any incidents.

In addition, we prioritised the training of our staff and volunteers on child protection protocols and reporting mechanisms. These training sessions ensured that everyone involved in our organisation was well-prepared to handle child protection matters effectively and responsibly.

Safeguarding Campaign Highlights

Chibombo, Zambia 🍞

As part of our ongoing commitment to child protection and safeguarding, we collaborated with One Stop Centre under the Ministry of Health Zambia to raise awareness on critical issues such as child abuse, neglect, and child marriage at one of our supported schools. The campaign was attended by forty-four community members and focused on the importance of reporting cases of child abuse and violence. A significant outcome of the campaign was the establishment of a dedicated school Child Protection Committee, consisting of village leaders, the school headteacher, parents/caregivers, and learners. This committee will meet regularly to address safeguarding





concerns and ensure the safety of all children at the school.

Building on this success, we held another awareness campaign in collaboration with Women in Law and Development in Africa (Wildaf Zambia) and One Stop Centre at a different school. The sessions targeted parents/caregivers, learners, and community leaders and discussed children's rights, including sexual reproductive health rights. The sessions were well-received, leading to the formation of another child protection committee comprising parents/caregivers, headmen, teachers, and learners.

These initiatives have had a significant impact, as evidenced by the reporting of five cases of girl-child abuse, including instances of defilement, early child marriages, and early child pregnancies. We commend the bravery of the community members who came forward to report these cases and ensure that the affected girls receive the necessary support to overcome the trauma they have endured. We are committed to providing tailored support plans to empower them on their journey to healing and resilience.

We would like to emphasise that we are actively investigating numerous other cases that have come to our attention. Our ultimate goal is to create a safe environment for every girl-child, free from abuse and exploitation. We are thrilled with the progress we have made in advocating for and enforcing child safeguarding measures within the Chibombo community, thanks to the tireless efforts of our Catalyst team. Moving forward, we plan to replicate these impactful campaigns and committees across our other partner schools in Zambia, establishing a robust, community-led framework to protect all children from harm.



Safeguarding Campaign Highlights

Beatrice, Zimbabwe ≽ : Shining a Light on Drug and Sexual Abuse

We successfully held two fun run events in collaboration with Ringa, Muda, Manyoshwa, and Chihoro Primary Schools to raise awareness about the pressing issues of drug and sexual abuse in our local communities. The events gathered 500 learners (boys and girls) and had a profound positive impact on the community. Parents actively participated in the fun run aswell, cheering on the runners, and engaging in meaningful conversations with the guest speakers.

We were honored to have inspirational guest speakers join us and share valuable insights on the critical issues of drug and sexual abuse. A local police officer emphasised the importance of parents protecting their children from abuse and speaking out if they suspect any wrongdoing. The officer highlighted the need to break the cycle of abuse and ensure the safety of children. Additionally, a local nurse stressed the significance of creating safe spaces for girls at home, encouraging open conversations and support from parents. The nurse emphasised that positive behaviors start at home and should be reinforced in schools. It takes a partnership between families and schools to drive change in our communities.

Our dedicated Volunteer and Sports Programme Coordinator, Tatenda, expressed immense satisfaction with the outcome of the events. Tatenda stated, "It was an incredible two days that united our community for a vital cause. We eagerly anticipate more opportunities like this in the future as we continue to promote girl child participation in sports through our sports program at the schools we collaborate with."

We extend our heartfelt gratitude to the entire Catalyst team and all stakeholders involved for their unwavering dedication and efforts in making these events a resounding success!





Facilitation of Beneficiary National Identity Documents

We successfully facilitated the acquisition of national registration identity documents for three beneficiaries. This facilitation has had a significant and transformative effect on their educational journey and overall empowerment. Legal identification is an essential requirement for enrollment in schools and educational institutions. Having legal identification is crucial for the well-being of beneficiaries as it provides them with access to vital services, education, employment opportunities, legal protection, civic engagement, and travel opportunities. Possessing legal identification enables individuals to exercise their rights, access resources, pursue their aspirations, and actively participate in society.

Beneficiary Safeguarding Case Study

Background:

Recently, we were made aware of a distressing sexual abuse case involving a beneficiary in Beatrice, Zimbabwe. Our utmost priority was to prioritise her safety, well-being, and support during this challenging time. To kickstart our efforts, we collaborated with law enforcement agencies and legal authorities to ensure a thorough investigation and appropriate action.

Actions Taken:

Upon learning of the incident, we took immediate action to ensure the safety and well-being of the beneficiary. We provided her with necessary medical care, counselling, and support services, working closely with local authorities and relevant support organisations specialising in sexual abuse cases.







Current Status:

As of the date of this update, we can confirm that the alleged perpetrator has been apprehended and is currently in custody, awaiting trial. We have been in close communication with law enforcement agencies, and they have assured us of their commitment to actively pursue the legal process and ensure justice is served.



Legal Proceedings:

We will continue to cooperate fully with the legal authorities and provide any necessary assistance to ensure a thorough investigation and fair trial. We are prepared to provide any required documentation or testimonies to support the legal process.



Ongoing Support:

We are committed to providing ongoing support to the beneficiary during this difficult time. We have connected the beneficiary with specialised counselling services to address her emotional and psychological trauma. Additionally, we will continue to monitor the situation closely and remain in regular contact with the beneficiary to ensure her well-being.

Our Beneficiary, School and Community Support Introduction of our Music Club

We launched a pilot Music Club at Chihoro Primary School in Beatrice (Zimbabwe) led by Thembani Mhambi. The aim of this initiative was to provide learners with an opportunity to explore their musical talents and develop their artistic skills with a specific focus on learning the Violin.

The impact of the Music Club to date has gone a long way in supporting the practical side of the new curriculum under Visual and Performing Arts. We hope that we will acquire relevent funding to secure more musical instruments and open the Club to all learners at all the schools that we work with.

Our Beneficiary, School and Community Support School Infrustructural Development and Resource Assistance

Throughout the year, we supported the schools that we have partnered with by providing a range of resources and materials. Our aim was to enhance the learning environment and expand educational opportunities for all learners. These efforts are deeply rooted in our mission to foster an inclusive and nurturing educational setting where girls in particular can truly flourish.

Technological Support

We are thrilled to have provided ten laptops as part of our dedication to promoting digital literacy. This initiative has been instrumental in enhancing learners' computer literacy skills and granting them access to a wide range of educational resources that foster digital learning.



English Reading Programme Support

We made a donation of 100 Sunrise Readers to support the English Reading Programmes in schools. The purpose of this support was to assist in enhancing the English language skills and proficiency of the learners. These reading materials served a dual purpose: promoting literacy development and nurturing a love for reading among the learners. It was truly inspiring to witness how these resources fostered a culture of learning and personal growth among the learners.



Sporting Kits

We supplied sporting kits to encourage physical activity and promote a healthy lifestyle among learners. The kits included:

- four volleyballs,
- two volleyball nets,
- three netballs,
- two soccer balls,
- one soccer net,
- two pairs of goal keeper gloves,
- fifteen gold medals for competitions, and
- a stopwatch to facilitate organised sports activities.







Teaching Supplies

By donating these materials, we aimed to assist the teachers in delivering effective lessons and creating engaging learning experiences for all learners. School Feeding Programme Assistance



The Challenge

At a young age, Chihera tragically lost both her parents, leaving her as a double orphan. This had a profound impact on her as they were her main source of support. Fortunately, her maternal grandmother took her and her siblings in and provided for their basic needs. As her grandmother grew older, however, she could no longer work to support the entire family of eight, leading to significant financial difficulties. As a result, Chihera faced frequent school dropouts due to unpaid fees and lacked essential school supplies. Additionally, the lack of food caused her health to deteriorate, resulting in malnutrition and illness. Despite these challenges, Chihera's family did not prioritise her education, believing that, culturally, she should stay at home to assist with household chores.

Our Approach to Identifying Chihera's needs

When we first met Chihera, her infectious smile and positive outlook on life captured our hearts. After speaking with her teachers, we discovered that she possessed remarkable intelligence and had the potential to excel academically. However, her significant gaps in education during her early years resulted in below-average performance in class. Conducting a comprehensive assessment of Chihera's needs provided us with a deep understanding of her family background and the daily challenges she faced. Recognising her unique potential, we developed a personalised long-term support plan to address the

barriers that hindered her consistent attendance at school. We firmly believed in Chihera's extraordinary abilities and knew that, with the right assistance, she could realise her dream of becoming a Doctor and become the best version of herself.

The Process we followed to Empower Chihera

Based on the insights gathered from Chihera's comprehensive needs assessment, the Catalyst Foundation team devised a personalised support plan to eliminate the obstacles that previously hindered her access to education. Addressing Chihera's deteriorating health was our foremost priority. Through thorough health examinations, we determined that her condition was primarily due to malnutrition, and thankfully, no major health issues were detected. To tackle this, we provided her with specialised food hampers, effectively resolving the health concern. Regarding her education, Chihera lacked a school uniform, shoes, stationery, and textbooks, which posed challenges to her attendance and academic progress. We ensured that these essential needs were met, enabling her to attend school without any barriers. Additionally, to help her catch up on missed coursework, we funded her extra lessons.

The Results (impact made to date)


With the help of Catalyst Foundation, Chihera's life and well-being have experienced remarkable improvements. She is now in excellent health and receives proper nutrition. The consistent assistance provided to her family has ensured that they can enjoy three meals a day, relieving Chihera's grandmother of the financial burden of supporting her, particularly regarding education. In terms of education, Chihera has made significant strides academically and has gained newfound confidence. Her involvement in school outings, S.H.E. Clubs, and annual S.H.E. Camps has contributed to her personal growth. Witnessing Chihera's inspiring transformation thus far motivates us to continue empowering this remarkable young girl through the S.H.E. Programme. Our goal whilst embarking on her journey with us is to equip her with the necessary knowledge, skills, and opportunities to turn her dream of becoming a doctor into a reality.

MEET MAINZA.

The Challenge

At a young age, Mainza dropped out of school due to her family being unable to afford her education. Once dropped out, she became an early child bride and gave birth to two beautiful sons. Sadly in 2022 at 25 years old, her husband passed away and because of this, she had no means to survive and be able to look after her two sons. To meet their basic needs and put them through school, she undertook various piece jobs in the local farming community to earn a living. Towards the end of 2022, Mainza decided to go back to school as she was passionate about becoming educated and hoped that it would bring about opportunities for her to improve her family's difficult situation. She worked day and night to earn enough money to put herself back in school and at the start of 2023, now 26 years old, she enrolled herself at the same school where her two sons learn. Whilst attaining her education, she continued working to ensure that her family was taken care of. Before becoming a beneficiary, her daily routine involved waking up at 2am to go to the field to work and then finishing work at 6am to go back home and prepare herself and her sons for school.

Our Approach to Identifying Cheyenne's needs

The Catalyst team conducted their 'Thorough Needs Assessment' on Mainza to understand what her basic needs are. Academically, Mainza is gifted and has the potential to achieve great things with the right support. Her resilience, and determination to complete her education led us to select her to be a S.H.E Programme beneficiary. Due to her outstanding story and passion for helping other vulnerable girls, Mainza underwent SMART advocacy training to become a peer educator in the Chibombo district where she will actively champion girls' rights and come up with youth-friendly spaces in the community and amongst our other S.H.E. girls.

The Process we followed to Empower Mainza

Based on the insights gathered from Mainza's comprehensive needs assessment, the Catalyst Foundation team devised a personalised support plan to eliminate the obstacles that previously hindered her and her sons' access to education. To tackle this, we ensured that Mainza's essential basic schoolneeds were met, enabling her and her sons to attend school without any barriers.

The Results (impact made to date)


Now that Mainza is part of our big family, she can focus on her education barrier-free and has peace of mind knowing that her family is well taken care of. Her academic performance in class has improved significantly with her passing her recent

examinations with flying colours. Her confidence has also grown and due to Catalyst Foundation meeting all of her needs, she no longer has anxiety about various things such as what she will feed her children at home. Through receiving quality education, Mainza is now determined more than ever to pursue nursing as a profession. Now that you have learnt a bit more about Mainza's inspiring story, I am sure you know why we are so proud of her. Her success illustrates that it is possible to overcome challenges and achieve your goals, even when the odds are stacked against you.

WITNESS HOW OUR BESPOKE SUPPORT MADE AN IMPACT ON ODETA'S LIFE!

Odeta resides with her uncle and aunt, and she lacks knowledge about her biological parents since her uncle took custody of her at the age of 5. She was raised by her uncle until she began Grade 1 at school. Prior to her enrollment in the S.H.E. Programme, her academic performance was extremely poor, and she was unable to read even a single word in English. Her progress was subpar, and she could only pass double-digit numbers by the end of each term. However, in the second term of 2023, she achieved a passing grade of 15.

Through various interventions, such as one-on-one mentorship, encouragement, participation in reading marathons, and a focus on studying, Odeta has made tremendous strides in her academic performance. She can now read English proficiently, and her handwriting has also improved. In the previous term, she attained the 5th position in her class, scoring 54% overall. The teachers have also testified to Odeta's notable improvement.

When asked about Odeta's progress, her uncle remarked:

"Odeta had no knowledge or skills, her performance was below average, and I was unsure how to assist her. She struggled with reading and writing, and her class ranking was consistently above 15. I am grateful to the Catalyst Foundation for their support, which has enabled her to acquire these essential skills. Her behavior has also undergone a drastic transformation, and she now adheres to the organization's requirements as well as those of her parents. I extend my sincere appreciation to the teachers and the Catalyst Foundation for their pivotal role in Odeta's life."

When we arrived at Khongisile's home we recognised their vulnerability. Firstly, we noticed that their dinner consisted of simply boiled cassava leaves and that their diet was not balanced. Secondly, we realised that their bathroom was inadequate and posed many challenges for the family. Khongisile's grandmother struggled to stand while bathing, which our C.E.O. emphasised was not right.

Our Approach to Improving the Family's Current Situation

After understanding the needs of the family, through our S.H.E. Programme's bespoke support, we took immediate action to remove some of these barriers faced.

The Process we followed to empower Khongisile and her family

After seeing what Khongile and the family were eating for dinner, this did not sit well with us as a team. So, we arrived at Khongisile's home to deliver some groceries, and we made a heartfelt decision to cook a delicious and nutritious meal for the whole family. After witnessing the family's current bathroom, we knew something had to be done about it, and we committed to rebuilding it for them.

The Results (impact made)

Khongisile's grandmother was deeply moved by the gestures of our support, and tears welled up in her eyes repeatedly. It was a moment of disbelief for her to realize that her family was receiving such incredible support. The moments we shared with the family filled our hearts with immense joy and love, creating lasting memories that will forever hold a special place in our hearts. Thanks to our efforts, the family can now enjoy balanced meals and has a purpose-built bathroom that meets their needs.

Additionally, the lack of access to sanitary products exacerbates their discomfort, leading to embarrassment about their bodily changes.

Regrettably, girls with poor menstrual hygiene practices frequently drop out of school, creating barriers to education. Their choice to stay at home due to these issues may subject them to child labour, early marriages or pregnancies, and exploitation. Our S.H.E. Programme's unique support includes teaching good menstrual hygiene practices and empowering our beneficiaries and other girls in the schools we work with to take control of their menstrual cycles. This allows them to thrive in school without discomfort and gives them the opportunity to be agents of change within their communities.

We express our deep gratitude to our anonymous donor for their generous donation of reusable sanitary pads. Your contribution to the fight against menstrual poverty is truly appreciated.

To conclude our celebrations, all the learners headed down to the sporting grounds and engaged in friendly matches, which was a highlight for many. World Menstrual Hygiene Day 2023

The day began with Wendy educating all beneficiaries about menstruation and healthy menstrual hygiene practices. This was vitally important as it empowered our beneficiaries to take full control of their menstruation and prevented any potential health issues in the future. In the second part of the day, our beneficiaries were trained on how to make their own reusable sustainable sanitary pads.

In rural communities, many adolescent girls face difficulties in accessing sanitary products, which often leads to school absenteeism or dropout due to feelings of shame or embarrassment. Some resort to using unsafe alternatives like cow dung or leaves. However, with the knowledge and materials provided, our beneficiaries can now manage their menstrual cycles safely.

Wendy emphasised, "As a young girl, you can't learn if you are unable to manage your menstruation."





Careers Day Highlights 2023

The Catalyst team organised a Careers Day at one of the supported schools in the Chibombo district of Zambia. This event aimed to provide the learnerswith exposure to various career paths they could pursue after completing their education. The impact of this event was remarkable, as it ignited inspiration among the learners to strive harder in their studies, knowing that their dreams could become a reality. Our beneficiaries participated enthusiastically, dressing up as their future selves in their desired professions.




'Cycle for Girls' Fundraiser 2023

General Networking Events

Women and Environmental Rights Symposium 2023

Kudzai participated in the 'Women and Environmental Rights Symposium' organised by the Women's Coalition of Zimbabwe. The symposium focused on the theme of 'Connecting Voices for Collective Action and Advocacy' and highlighted the crucial role played by women in environmental protection. It emphasised the importance of involving women in decision-making processes and creating gender-responsive policies. Lack of inclusion has led to various challenges faced by women, necessitating the need for policy changes.

One significant concern raised during the symposium was the water shortages in Zimbabwe, particularly affecting girls in rural communities. The lack of access to clean water during menstrual cycles has resulted in numerous health issues for these girls. They are forced to travel long distances to reach the nearest water sources, which are often contaminated due to sharing with animals, leaving them vulnerable.

The round table discussion focused on the topic of 'The Women and Environmental Humanitarian Crisis.' Several challenges and problems were identified, including limited accessibility to reach affected women and girls, lengthy protocols during crises, lack of



understandable information for the public, insufficient food and sanitary wear, increased gender-based violence cases, document destruction, resource polarisation, and lack of access to services.

To address these challenges over the next five years, several strategies and solutions were proposed. These include increasing access to simple information in local languages, enhancing the participation of women in the Civil Protection Unity and policy-making processes, rehabilitating women-run businesses, simplifying processes for NGOs to make an impact, providing temporary structures to address the raised issues promptly, increasing psychosocial support for affected women and girls, and establishing government emergency packs.

Global Action Week for Education 2023

Education Coalition of Zimbabwe (ECOZ) hosted the celebrations at Bangari Secondary School in the Uzumba Maramba Pfungwe District in Zimbabwe, under the theme, 'Investing in a Just World: Decolonising Education Financing Now'. The event was graced by Provincial Education Directors from all the provinces, and delegates from the Ministry of Primary and Secondary Education.

During this event, ECOZ requested for the government to avail more resources and funds to the education sector, to ensure that the delivery of quality education and more resources are availed to the schools within the rural communities of Zimbabwe, especially in S.T.E.M (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) subjects, and I.C.T. A call was also made to the community to keep supporting and working hard for their community. Lastly, the N.G.O (Non-Governmental Organisation) sector along with the wider community, should keep advocating for education, as this is not a one day event!

This role requires Bertha to oversee a programme called 'Driving Sustainable Change for Children's Rights', which is being implemented across 20 districts in 7 provinces of Zambia.Whilst working for Save the Children International, Bertha has been involved in various projects within other organizations as well.

To begin with, she was part of the Society for Women and AIDS in Zambia (SWAZ), which exists to empower, advocate & support women & young people to address issues related to HIV/AIDS. Secondly, Bertha was the 'Programme/Project Manager' for Mwabu Zambia – a private education company that supports African primary school teachers with appropriate technology to improve learning outcomes, even in the most challenging of rural areas. Lastly, she was the 'Project Coordinator' at Right to Play International, which is an international NGO that uses sport for development.

We asked Bertha to share with us more information about why she decided to become a Trustee, and her experiences so far as part of Catalyst Foundation:

"I was honored and privileged to become a Trustee of Catalyst Foundation in December 2022, just before the S.H.E. Programme – Zambia chapter was officially set up. I decided to accept the opportunity to become a Trustee because I am a child rights activist and have been working in the social development sector for most, if not all my professional life. According to UNESCO, across Africa, 32.6 million girls of primary and lower secondary school age are out of school and this number rises to 52 million when looking at girls of upper secondary school age.

In Zimbabwe, only 14% of girls complete their upper secondary school, and among the most disadvantaged, this falls to 1%. 34% of girls are married before the age of 18, and 5% before the age of 15.

In Zambia, only 27% of girls complete their upper secondary school, and among the poorest children, this falls to 3%. 29% of girls are married before the age of 18, and 5% before the age of 15.

As a result of not going to school, girls become vulnerable and may become victims of: child abuse, child rape, early child marriages/pregnancies, HIV/AIDS and the list goes on...

We need to close this education gap as every girl-child deserves the right to education!
